Poet's Corner

What a triumphantly moving and poetic month it has been! Poetry at Highfield continues to make the news.

Earlier this month, two year 6 pupils, Miki (6W) and Saaqib (6C) won a London-wide creative writing competition with poems written on the theme of 'War and Peace'. Their work was performed by professional actors at the Lost Theatre in Stockwell and will be displayed in the Weiner Library www.wienerlibrary.co.uk the world's oldest institution devoted to the study of the Holocaust & Genocide from December 10. The competition was organized by Rewrite www.rewrite.org.uk a group that brings together young people from different backgrounds to fight prejudice and injustice, through the power of drama and writing.

Pupils at Highfield understand this principle well. In October, Yr 4 produced some powerful poetry for Black History month; a sequence of haikus that described the life and achievements of athlete Alice Coachman, the first black woman to win an Olympic Gold medal. And over the past few weeks pupils and teachers all over the school have made it their responsibility to 'Stamp out Bullying' for Children in Need. The intelligent and passionate poetry they have been writing on the subject delivers that message loud and clear.

A small group of dedicated young poets across years 3 - 6 was formed to workshop some original poems to submit to the Barnet Open Poetry Competition. The subjects ranged from family, friends, home, school, loved pets and wildlife. There were poems about fireworks and seeing the Queen and even the big subjects like the world, the future and eternity. Fingers crossed there will be some more Highfield

winners when the results of the competition are announced in January 2015.

Yr 5 & 6 school council members have been buddying up with patients from the North London Hospice, writing poetry and creating beautiful memory boxes to preserve treasured memories in. It has been a joyful celebration of life and friendship. The project continues until December 9th when pupils and patients will perform and share the work they have done together.

Completed applications must be returned to the Admissions Office, Enfield Civic Centre by the deadline of **7**th **January 2015**. If you are a resident of another Local Authority, eg Barnet or Haringey the form should be sent to that Local Authority Admissions Office. The deadline is the same for online applications.

Food in School Review

As you are aware from last month's newsletter, we have been reviewing food in school. Following the Department for Education's revised guidance (July 2014) and a visit by an Enfield Local Authority representative we now have to bring the school in line with other schools and National advice. See

New revised standards define the foods and drinks which are restricted and those which must not be provided. This applies to foods provided on school premises but also to breakfast and after school clubs.

Nut-free foods

We will continue to be a "nut-free" school – please do not send in any lunchtime foods containing nuts as we have children who have severe allergies and foods containing nuts represent a serious risk to those children.

Snacks

No snacks can be provided other than seeds, fruit or vegetables without added fat, salt, sugar or honey. Cakes and biscuits can only be provided as part of a school lunch (including packed lunches) and cannot be given out at breakfast and after school clubs.

Exceptions to the School Food Regulations

Confectionery cannot be provided at any time of the school day. Exceptions to the school food regulations

- At parties or celebrations to make religious or cultural occasions
- · At occasional fund-raising events
- As rewards for achievement, good behaviour or effort
- For use in teaching preparation and cookery skills, provided that any food prepared is not served to pupils as part of a school lunch
- On an occasional basis by parents/carers or pupils.

Birthday treats

As treats can be given on an occasional basis by parents/carers or pupils, and following a request for your views on whether children should be allowed to bring in small bags of chocolates (Maltesers, buttons) we will continue to allow this as no-one expressed strong views on removing this, except to say they did not want "sweets" given out. Teachers will only allow small treat bags of Maltesers or chocolates – nothing else. Please do not send in anything else – Haribos or cakes are not allowed and will be returned to parents/carers at the end of the school day if sent in. However children must wait until they have left the school, to eat the treats.

Tuck Shop

Sadly, the tuck shop on Fridays for Years 3-6 will not be able to continue as confectionery and crisps etc are not allowed. We are looking into alternative products that are allowed such as seeds, fruit and items without added fat, salt, sugar or honey. We will update you on this when this is completed but the tuck shop as we know it have now ended and the new style ones will not start until sometime in January to allow time to explore "sugar-free" options.

However, we know that our children love the opportunity to go the tuck shop and it definitely helps them be responsible with money and get to know the cost of items etc, we have decided to plan the "occasional fund- raising" tuck shop to support our charity fund-raising. In 2015 all profits will go to the North London Hospice, who

we are working with on a School Council project this year.

Therefore every term we will aim to have a tuck shop and it will be open for Years 1-6. The first new fundraising tuck shop will open on Tuesday 16 December. **50p can be spent – please send in change and not £1 coins please.** We will let you have the Spring and Summer term dates nearer the time.

Again, as occasional fund-raising events are allowed to sell confectionery, cakes etc these will continue as planned.

Dining Hall

Thank you to our catering staff who invited families in on 19th November to taste lots of the new recipes they will be making for us in the coming months.

Office Times

Reminder that the new office times are as follows:

Open from **8.45** to **9.30am** and again at **3.00** to **3.45pm**.

Please do not come into the office at any other time, as the staff will not be able to see you or deal with any concerns. You can leave messages on the school answer machine. It is very important that your children become responsible and remember everything they need for school, such as homework, book bags, lunch boxes, water bottles, PE kits etc. We cannot have parents/carers coming into the school all through the day dropping these items of for them. This is very time consuming for the office staff who have a very busy schedule of work that they need to be getting on with during the day. Trip money must be returned with the permission slip in an envelope

with your child's name and class on; your child must give this envelope to their teacher or put it in the post box in the reception area.

Due to health and safety requirements we cannot have buggies, prams, scooters etc inside the new school reception area. There are shelters outside where you can store them.

Passive Smoking

To a very small group of Parent/Carers, you must have consideration for others when smoking directly outside the schools gates, it is unfair for the children and parents trying to get into the school and having to inhale the smoke! We continue to receive a large amount of complaints about this and hope that people will now think about their behaviour when so many parents and such young children have to pass by and inhale the smoke just to enter the school.

Car Parking

Unfortunately some families are inconsiderate to the residents of Highfield Road by parking across their drive-ways, you are blocking them in and are very rude when they ask you to move your car. This is not the sort of behaviour that is acceptable or that you should be demonstrating in front of your children.

Ilegal parking on zig-zag lines is a traffic offence and car registration numbers are being submitted to the traffic/highway police who will issue you with a fine.
