OUR 3 JARS

These 3 jars represent 3 words that are very important to us.

These words help us ensure that our **values** in our school are carried out by everyone!

The words are:

RESPECT CO-OPERATION KINDNESS

If an **adult** sees any child showing **RESPECT CO-OPERATION OR KINDNESS** they are given a **red** bead to put into the jar. If **any child** sees any adult showing **RESPECT CO-OPERATION OR KINDNESS** they are given a **Yellow** bead to put into the jar.

On Friday 19th October, 4A presented their class assembly to KS2 and their parents. We took on the roles of animals living in various habitats, news anchors, field reporters and experts. Using our knowledge from our science lessons and additional research we delivered a fun and informational performance! iGospel

This term, Year 3 have been taking part in iGospel workshops. IGospel is a team of professional singers and musicians who work in many schools to bring gospel music alive. 3L, 3CA and 3I are learning to sing a range of songs, including some that reflect our school's values of Cooperation, Kindness and Respect. The children are working with David Leval to improve rhythm, tone and pitch and are greatly enjoying the sessions. Some of the children have also had the opportunity to take on solo parts! The children can't wait to perform to the school at the end of term!







Cross Country Competition

On Friday 28th September Highfield took part in the Enfield Borough Cross country competition in Forty Hall. This was the first time Highfield had entered the event competing against twenty-four other schools. It was a beautiful day and our team consisting of Martyna, Carmen, Laura, Victor, Rayan, Stefan, Michael and Avin ran around the tough 1.2mile course. The whole team achieved an amazing 12th place, with Victor finishing in 3rd place in the boys' race (out of over 100 boys). Well done Highfield's cross-country team and a big thank you to Mrs Redondo for her help and expertise.

Year 5 Shakespeare Workshop

This afternoon, we were visited by an actor and educator from the Young Shakespeare Company. Under his direction, we told the story of A Midsummer Night's Dream. One by one, he introduced us to a complex cast of characters: There were illicit lovers and jealous suitors; a proud fairy king and his haughty fairy queen; a band of simple workmen and a group of mischievous imps. At key turning points, we stopped to discuss their thoughts and feelings, actions and motives. We tested our skills of prediction and inference and learned lines of Shakespearean English. Using our voices, we mimicked the sounds of owls and wolves, and the school hall was transformed into a forest at night. It was an immersive experience and an enchanting introduction to one of Shakespeare's most famous comic plays. We are all looking forward to watching it performed at the Millfield Theatre.







Black History Month at Highfield

During Black History Month, the children have been learning about inspirational black women that have made a difference throughout history with their lasting legacy. Each year group were given key individuals to focus on during this month, as they researched and learnt all about their lives and actions for change. Some of the inspirational women that were covered include; Raven Wilkinson (Ballerina), Lorna Simpson (Photographer), Mahalia Jackson (Gospel singer), Althea Gibson (Tennis champion), Phyllis Wheatley (Poet) and Katherine Johnson (NASA mathematician). Across the school there was a wonderful range of activities going on, including film making, creating fact files and appreciating the work of musicians, all celebrating the achievements of these women. Black History Month at Highfield has allowed the children to explore how and why these inspiring black women have changed the world we live in today and how they can help to shape their own futures.







Year 5 take a step back in time!

On Wednesday October 3rd, Year 5 took a step back in time and visited Hampton Court Palace. Throughout Autumn 1 and as part of our whole school topic 'Step Back in Time', Year 5 have been engrossed in learning about Tudor Britain and the reign of the notorious King Henry VIII. The trip to Hampton Court Palace was a brilliant way to end a fantastic unit of work and gave year 5 the opportunity to roam the palace as young Henry once did. The visit was a great success and saw the children engaging in an interactive workshop themed on the Great Kitchens and exploring Henry VIII's Apartment. Highlights include visiting the Chapel where Henry once married Catherine Howard and admiring the Great Dining Hall with its beautiful stained-glass windows. A fantastic time was had by all and a big thank-you goes to all the adults who helped on the day.

On Friday 12th October 2018, future computing engineers from nine local Enfield primary schools gathered their Year 5 students to engineer their own robotic devices. The ultimate aim of this event was to get children to interact with children from opposite schools and to get students interested in and excited about the fields in engineering, mechatronics, and software, using Lego education and Boe-bots. Our children did an exceptional job and even managed to make their Robots dance.

MAKE EVERY SCHOOL DAY COUNT

At Highfield Primary - Attendance & Punctuality

Regular attendance and punctuality at school is very important for your child's wellbeing. Children who miss school are missing out on essential social interaction which can affect their ability to make friends. The facts show that if your child doesn't attend school regularly, they are less likely to do as well as other children.

At Highfield we are committed to working together with parents to increase the attendance and punctuality of all our pupils.

Although being absent cannot always be helped as we all do become ill from time to time, please note at Highfield School we expect all our children to aim for 100% attendance each half term and to be on time every day, every week! Take a look at the table below to show you exactly what your child could be missing over the year.

TIME ABSENT FROM SCHOOL	ATTENDANCE
0	100% attendance
10 DAYS	95% attendance
19 DAYS	90% attendance
28 DAYS	85% attendance
More than half a term	80% attendance
9 + weeks	75% attendance

EVERY MINUTE COUNTS

As well as being absent a lot from school effecting your child's development being **LATE** also has a big effect, please look at the table below.

<u>Lateness = Lost Learning</u> (figures below are calculated over a school year)	
5 mins late each day	3 days lost
10 mins late each day	6.5 days lost
15 mins late each day	10 days lost
20 mins late each day	13 days lost
30 mins late each day	19 days lost

Every day your child is absent from school affects their education! You will notice from the figures above, that the odd day off really does mount up. Please be aware that Highfield School WILL NOT AUTHORISE any HOLIDAYS during term time, this is done in the interest of your child's education.

DRIVING SAFELY & PARKING AROUND THE SCHOOL

Thank you to the vast majority of parent/carers who are taking road safety outside our school very seriously. It is so important that everyone does this to avoid putting our children in danger. It is in the interest of all our children that everyone drives carefully.

Could we please ask parent/carers NOT to use the car park entrance of the school as a place to turn their vehicles around. Children and parents are walking across it. We need to keep everyone safe.

PARKING ACROSS RESIDENTS' DRIVES

Unfortunately, we have had several complaints of a small number of parents parking across local residents' drives. This behaviour is unacceptable and means that residents have been unable to pick their children up from school, have missed medical appointments and has generally caused them inconvenience. Please do not park in front of peoples' drives. There is alternative parking further away from the school and we would encourage people not to drive at all if possible, as the high number of vehicles around the school make it dangerous for children. At Highfield we are part of the local community and we need to respect everyone in it.
