#### **Class Community Action Plans**



## JTA Early Morning Survey

On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> October Highfield's Junior Travel Ambassadors came to school early so that they could carry out a before school survey. They were extremely fortunate that PC Doris was able to come along to help them and ensure that every member of the Highfield community is safe on their way to school.

The JTA children monitored how safely children were arriving at school, including safe dropping off from cars and if children were holding their adults hand whilst crossing the road. They were very happy that lots of children were

coming to school on bikes or scooters, however they saw a lot of children crossing the road without looking both ways or holding their adults hand. These are the areas that the JTA children have decided to focus on this term.

#### Year 2's Black History Day

Year 2 were very lucky to take part in a day of activities to celebrate Black History Month. We learnt about influential people and how they contributed to modern day society. One activity was finding out about Mary Seacole and her influential work on medicine and hospital care. To celebrate the children created storyboards about her life we also learnt about footballer Ian Wright and completed Maths questions about his number of goals. Lastly, we created identity photos in the style of Lorna Simpson, a photographer,who uses photos and photos to express her views. What an amazing day we had!





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## Year 4 Trip to Broomfield Park

On Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> October, Year 4 took a trip to explore the facilities at Broomfield Park. On our visit we looked at the Boating Lake, the Wetland Development, the Conservatory, the Remembrance Garden, the Community Café, the Green Gym and the Adventure Playground. During this we investigated the number of visitors, why it might be of interest to visitors and adjective to describe the different places. We then used this information to create a visitor guides for Brookfield Park.



#### 4MC Assembly

On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> October 4MC performance their amazing assembly 'We can make a difference'. The assembly focused on environmental issues and the children identified many problems and expressed their ideas for change e.g. recycling, upcycling reducing the amount of plastic they use. They had so much fun performing the songs and the poem.



#### Year 5 Robot day

Highfield pupils had another chance to boost their STEM learning on Friday 11th October 2019. Local Enfield primary schools gathered their future computing engineers from Year 5 students to develop their own robotic devices. Highfield were represented by Louca (5P), Ella (5D ) and Isabelle (5B).

The children spent the morning building and programming robots using a combination of mechanics, electronics, problem solving and teamwork, in the afternoon they applied these skills to use more advanced programming to create a more sophisticated robot. The ultimate aim of this event was to get children to interact with children from opposite schools and to get students interested in and excited about the fields in engineering, mechatronics, and software, using Lego education and Boe-bots. Our children did an exceptional job; they managed to make their Robots dance and were even able to synchronise their robot with one from another school.

Louca, "I enjoyed working with children from other schools, it was interesting to work together to programme our robot. At first, it was tricky to work out what to do but with hard work, we finally managed to get our robot to make a range of movements".

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#### Pre-loved Uniform Sale

A huge thank you to everyone who donated school uniform, the staff who helped organise and run the sale and everyone who came along to grab themselves a bargain. We are pleased that this has contributed to our commitment to reduce, re-use and recycle as much as possible – which many of the children at Highfield feel very passionate about! We have raised over £60, which shall go towards buying construction toys and games for the Thinking Room.

We will be holding further uniform sales in the spring and summer term.



#### Year 6 Trip to Bhaktivedanta Manor

As part of the Year 6 Autumn RE topic on Hinduism, we visited Bhaktivedanta Manor in Watford. We learnt about Hindu religious beliefs in an informative talk, listened to a Hindu story, fed cows, went on a cart ride pulled by oxen, tried on saris and even got treated to a delicious lunch!
