STEM Week at Highfield

As part of our STEM Week this year, each class focussed their learning on a book by the fantastic author, Ellie Jackson. We were lucky enough to have virtual assemblies with her where she talked about her personal experiences and how these led to her writing books about sustainability.





Year 2 - We can have fun by doing other things like not throwing balloons in the sky, we could blow bubbles or fly kites. (Dayana)

Year 3 - I really enjoyed learning about Buddy's Rainforest rescue as it has helped me understand why there aren't many orangutans - Herbie

Year 4 - I think the book proves that animals are just as important as humans. We should respect them and not ruin their homes. (Aleeha)

Year 5 - These books are very inspirational and they help people to understand the effects of climate change. (Abdullahi)

I like how her books are based on real stories because it helps us to understand what is really happening - it also educates people. (Olivia)

<u>Year 6</u>

During STEM Week, Year 6 looked at the impact of climate change on a polar bear's habitat (linked to Ellie Jackson's book - Hunter's Icy Adventure. We completed a range of cross-curricular activities throughout the week: News reports to document the impact of climate change (English), polar bear drawings (Art), iceberg investigation (Science), mapping iceberg coordinates (Maths outdoor learning), virtual assembly with Ellie Jackson, comparing a human diet to a polar bear's diet (Science) and exploring the Inuit diet (D&T).



Year 5

Inspired by Ellie Jackson's book, Nelson's Dangerous Dive, 5M spent the week investigating plastics in the world's oceans and it's effects on sea life. Our outdoor activities involved coordinates races, a plastic island problem solving game and the creation of sea creatures from natural objects. In DT we evaluated and redesigned packaging for Healthy wraps in order to make them plastic free.



Year 4

Inspired by Ellie Jackson's book, Sunny's Blazing Battle, Year 4 spent the week creating their very own torches! After reading the story book in our Comprehension lessons and taking part in a virtual assembly with the author, it inspired us to create something unique and spectacular. We decided the purpose of our torches was to either aid a firefighter searching high and low in the forest for koalas, or for the vets that worked tirelessly to help nurse the koalas back to health. In Maths, we investigated average lengths and weights of koalas, representing them in a variety of ways. In DT, we designed a torch and listed all the materials we would need to create our product. In Science, we explored different types of switches we could make using just card, paper clips and split pins! When we found the best type of switch, we incorporated it into our final design. There were some parts of our prototypes that didn't quite work but we worked hard to improve our products the best we could.



STEM Fair continued

Year 1

Year 1 had an amazing time during STEM week. They were sent a letter from Traction Man asking them to help design him a new outfit for his mission to Antarctica. The children used their knowledge about materials from our Science topic and also their fantastic design skills in DT to design an outfit which was warm, thick, waterproof and flexible. They created their own outfits and then tested them to check that they met all of Traction Man's criteria.



Reception

In Reception we read the story 'The Polar Bear's Home' and spoke about the Arctic where the story was set. The children learnt about how the polar bear's home is melting due to global warming. To see this in action we observed ice melt in our classrooms and saw how this turned into water like we predicted. The children used different materials to create dens for the polar bears and thought about what they could do to help save the polar bear's home.

Nursery

In Nursery, we focused on two books - 'Where's the Elephant?' and 'Handa's Surprise'.

We thought about deforestation, and how the animals would have been feeling, and how it made us feel.

Deforestation is "cutting trees down" (Ayman) and "is very sad" (Oscar-George). Neer: "The three animals are feeling sad 'cos some people chopped down some trees." Mabel: "loud because many people are in the houses."

We planted cress seeds, and cared for the plants. Frankie: "We need to give them water to drink, so they will grow."

We built some homes for the animals to live in. We went to Sainsbury's to buy the fruit that Handa put in her basket for Akeyo. We used magnifying glasses to investigate the different fruits, and we used iPads to take some photos of the fruits.

We used balance scales to weigh the fruits. Aidan: "The pineapple is so heavy."

We really enjoyed tasting all of the different fruits.

STEM Fair

To finish off our fantastic STEM week, we held a Highfield STEM Fair on Monday 28th March. All year groups had the opportunity to showcase their learning and classes were able to visit the fair and have a go at some of the interactive activities set up. We were also lucky enough to have some Winchmore Secondary School students join us in the afternoon - they were really impressed with the range of activities completed by all year groups.





Year Four Cross Country

On March 4th Highfield took part in a Year Four Cross Country competition at Lee Valley Athletics Stadium. The girls' and boys' teams ran approximately 1200 meters around the outside of the outdoor running track. It was a tough race but every member of the team ran their best with Isabelle and Sebastian both coming 16th out of 40 in their races. Congratulations also to Orgita, Anne Charlotte, Kamea, William, Dahen, Eljo and Valentino. Brilliant running!



Year 5/6 Football Team

Year 5 and 6 netball tournament at Highfield



















OUR WORLD, OUR FUTURE COMPETITION WINNERS
